The Honors College curriculum is designed with the needs of the superior student in mind. It is a University-wide program, leading to a degree with University Honors in a major of the student's choice. Emphasis is on small classes, excellence of instruction, and interaction between students and professors.

The University Honors College is housed in the Paul W. Martin Sr. Honors Building, a facility designed to provide a sense of community among high-achieving students.

Entering freshmen are eligible to participate in the Honors College if they have a minimum high school GPA of 3.50 and a 25 composite score on the ACT or SAT 1220. Returning MTSU and transfer students with 12 or more hours must have a cumulative GPA of 3.25 or greater to enroll in Honors classes.

Participation in the MTSU Honors College does not afford students an automatic waiver of out-of-state tuition.

Graduation Requirements

To graduate from the University Honors College, a student must

1. complete a minimum of 18 hours of lower-division Honors coursework or approved substitutions;
2. complete the following 11 hours of upper-division Honors coursework:
 - a. a minimum of 3 hours of any 3000/4000 Honors section or Honors upper-division contract (or approved upper-division study abroad or internship substitution);
 - b. 1 hour, UH 3000 - University Honors Lecture Series;
 - c. 3 hours, Honors Interdisciplinary Seminar (UH 3500, UH 4600, approved study abroad, internship substitution, UH 3900, or UH 4010);
 - d. 1 hour, UH 4900 - Honors Thesis Tutorial (Astronomy or Physics majors take ASTR 4850/PHYS 4850 - approval required);
 - e. 3 hours, UH 4950 - Honors Independent Research or Creative Project (Astronomy or Physics majors take ASTR 4900/PHYS 4900 - approval required);
3. have a minimum 3.25 overall GPA;
4. file an Intent to Graduate with University Honors form no later than the beginning of the semester of graduation.

Recognition

Students who graduate from the University Honors College

1. receive a certificate upon completion of 18 hours lower-division Honors coursework;
2. have all Honors coursework designated on their transcripts;
3. have University Honors College graduate designated on the official transcript and diploma;
4. wear special academic regalia at graduation.

Honors Associate Requirements

Students who lack the 18 lower-division Honors hours may earn an Honors Associate if they

1. have at least three semesters left before graduation;
2. receive approval from an Honors College advisor;

3. complete the following 11 hours of upper division Honors coursework:
 - a. a minimum of 3 hours of any 3000/4000 Honors section or Honors upper-division contract (or approved upper-division study abroad or internship substitution);
 - b. 1 hour, UH 3000 - University Honors Lecture Series;
 - c. 3 hours, Honors Interdisciplinary Seminar (UH 3500, UH 4600, approved study abroad, internship substitution, UH 3900, or UH 4010);
 - d. 1 hour, UH 4900 - Honors Thesis Tutorial (Astronomy or Physics majors take ASTR 4850/PHYS 4850 - approval required);
 - e. 3 hours, UH 4950 - Honors Independent Research or Creative Project (Astronomy or Physics majors take ASTR 4900/PHYS 4900 - approval required);
4. have a minimum 3.25 GPA.

An engraved University Honors College medallion is awarded upon the completion of the honors thesis. Students with an Honors Associate will not graduate from the Honors College, but completing a thesis can help make students more competitive for graduate school.

Honors Minors

Students who intend to complete the requirements to graduate through the University Honors College (29 hours) will add the Honors Minor to their overall degree requirements. Students who intend to complete an Honors Associate option will add the Honors Associate Minor (15 hours).

Students who receive the Buchanan, Transfer Fellow, or special honors four-year scholarships will have the applicable honors minor added to their program of study at the point of entry into the Honors College. Other students, unless approved by the Honors College to add the minor earlier, will add the Honors Minor (or the Honors Associate Minor) when they begin on their upper-division honors coursework. The Honors College will send a list of names to the Records office in order for the honors minor to be added to their program of study.

Additional minors or hours may be needed to fulfill University graduation requirements. Students must consult their major advisors. Students choosing to complete an honors minor must meet with an honors advisor to complete the honors upper-division form for their appropriate honors minor and to obtain a signature from the Honors College.

Honors students may receive Honors credit in non-Honors upper-division courses under special circumstances (see Honors).

The Honors Living and Learning Center

Students who enroll in at least one 3-hour Honors class per semester qualify for residence in the Honors College Living and Learning Community in Lyon Hall. MTSU Housing and Residential Life has worked with the Honors College to create a total learning environment that unites the education and the residential experiences. Lyon Hall, located in the historic section of campus, is home to a diverse group of students from all academic disciplines and includes both Honors and non-Honors students. Lyon Hall includes Miss Mary and McHenry Halls and can house 236 students. Qualifying students may request residency on a first-come, first-served basis and may request a specific roommate. Amenities include

- computer lab
- resident assistant on each floor
- meeting rooms and study rooms with carrels
- service-learning classroom
- floor lounges
- community kitchens and laundry facilities on every floor
- activities and programs to encourage community and academic growth
- blue bus route transports students to the Paul W. Martin Sr. Honors Building with pickup every 5 to 10 minutes

Publications

The Honors College publishes a semiannual honors magazine *Arete*; *Collage*, a literary magazine that accepts poetry, short stories, photography, and art; and *Scientia et Humanitas*, an undergraduate and graduate research journal that accepts essays in natural sciences, social sciences, and humanities.

Scholarships

The Honors College offers Buchanan Fellowships to 20 incoming freshmen a year, Honors Transfer Fellowships to 30 incoming transfer students a year and additional achievement scholarships to MTSU undergraduates who have distinguished themselves in Honors courses.

Study Abroad and Internships

The Honors College provides support for a variety of study abroad opportunities. Students wishing to receive Honors credit must complete an Honors Study Abroad Intent Form and meet with representatives of the MTSU Abroad office and the Honors advisor prior to the trip.

Students may request to use internship credits towards the honors minor requirements. Internships must count for college credit and show on the official MTSU transcript in order to substitute for honors requirements. Students must request approval prior to the start of the internship by submitting an Internship Credit Substitution Request form to an Honors College advisor.

Once final grades have been submitted for the internship, the credits will be evaluated by an honors advisor to determine if the earned credits will substitute for lower or upper division honors requirements. A maximum of six (6) hours will substitute for honors requirements. If the internship is graded on an A to F scale, the student must earn a B- or higher in order for the internship credits to substitute for honors requirements.

Undergraduate Fellowship Office

The Honors College is home to the Undergraduate Fellowship Office, which aids students interested in applying for Fulbright, Gilman, Goldwater, Truman, Marshall, National Defense, NSF REU's, and other national and international scholarships.

University Honors Associate Minor

The University Honors Associate Minor requires 15 hours. All courses within the minor may also be used to fulfill General Education requirements, major or minor requirements, or electives. With advisor's approval, a maximum of 9 credit hours of study abroad or a maximum of 6 credit hours of internship credits may be used toward these requirements. A 3.25 GPA is required.

University Honors Minor

The University Honors Minor requires 29 hours. All courses within the minor may also be used to fulfill General Education requirements, major or minor requirements, or electives. With advisor's approval, a maximum of 9 credit hours of study abroad or a maximum of 6 credit hours of internship credits may be used toward these requirements. A 3.25 GPA is required.

University Honors

UH 3000 - University Honors Lecture Series

1 credit hour A series of weekly one-hour lectures designed to stimulate thought and broaden the student's knowledge in a variety of fields. May be repeated for up to 3 hours credit. Pass/Fail.

UH 3001 - Honors Service Learning Practicum

1 to 3 credit hours Prerequisite: Permission of instructor. Opportunity to take part in service learning projects with community or on-campus partners. Pass/Fail. (May be repeated once for a total of three credits.)

UH 3200 - Visiting Artist's Seminar

1 credit hour Prerequisites: Junior standing and maintenance of a 3.25 GPA. An intensive workshop/seminar in one artistic form. The instructor will be a visiting artist whose course topic will depend on his or her field of experience.

UH 3500 - Junior Interdisciplinary Seminar

3 credit hours Prerequisite: Junior standing. (May be taken more than one time as topics change.) Introduces students to the political, social, economic, scientific, artistic, and/or humanistic aspects of culture, using an interdisciplinary approach. See class schedule for current semester's topic.

UH 3900 - Honors Research Seminar

3 credit hours Required of Honors Transfer Fellows. Introduces students from a variety of disciplines to the research methods necessary for successful completion of the honors thesis proposal and the honors thesis. Specific objectives include choosing a research topic, understanding the thesis process, identifying an appropriate faculty mentor, and drafting a tentative thesis topic. Assignments may include writing reports, assembling annotated bibliographies, and giving oral reports using appropriate technology. Course will be team-taught occasionally to expose students to multidisciplinary approaches to research.

UH 4010 - MTSU Institute of Leadership Excellence

3 credit hours Prerequisites: Permission of instructor; 3.0 cumulative GPA; must have completed 60 credit hours by start of course. An intensive learning experience in leadership excellence. Involves significantly more clock hours than the typical three-credit-hour course but offers a remarkably unique experience. The institute has three primary objectives: academic study of leadership theory and practice, with an emphasis on application; extensive exposure to accomplished leaders; and completion of a substantial student project, a part of which will be a personal action plan for leadership growth. Participants must be prepared to attend morning, afternoon, and evening sessions for one week during May term.

UH 4600 - Senior Interdisciplinary Seminar

3 credit hours (May be taken more than once as topics change.) Examines humanistic ideas. Reading materials drawn from literature, history, philosophy, science, art, and/or any other areas relevant to the semester topic. See online or RaiderMT class schedule for current semester's topic.

UH 4900 - Honors Thesis Tutorial

1 credit hour Designed to guide students and their advisors in the completion of an Honors thesis. Specific objectives include choosing and narrowing an appropriate topic, collecting a working bibliography, preliminary reading, and writing a thesis proposal. Pass/Fail.

UH 4950 - Honors Independent Research

3 to 9 credit hours (Only 3 credit hours may be counted toward the 29-hour requirement.) Interdisciplinary research for the advanced Honors student.
